TRANSIT TAX (Metro Vancouver) (WCR p. 1 and online)

Read the story on page one. Show learners a map of Metro Vancouver. (See a map and an opinion poll online.)

Present both sides of the transit tax argument. The WCR has summarized the yes and no side online: <http://www.thewestcoastreader.com/metro-vancouver-transit-tax-increase-yes-or-no/>

Show learners what the voting package looks like (“2015 Metro Vancouver Transportation and Transit Plebiscite”); explain who can vote and how to vote. Ask learners how they might vote and why. Explain the secret ballot as a voting method. Tell “voters” that their choices are anonymous. Hold a mock vote. Tally the results of the vote and share them with the class.

KIM PHUC (WCR, p. 2 and p. 3)

There are two stories on Kim Phuc: one is a submission, the other is a level one article by the WCR.

Before learners read one or two stories, give a little history about the Vietnam War (November 1, 1955 to April 30, 1975): www.youtube.com/watch?v=r0t-YBemwzs. Deaths: between 1.5 and 3.6 million people. Explain that Canada did not fight in this war.

A short, seven-minute documentary video (“The Napalm Girl”) with Nick Ut, the photographer, recounting Kim Phuc on that day in June 1972 is available at www.youtube.com/watch?v=Pa9auMart0E

- (5) Everyone helps her reach her dream (it) every day.

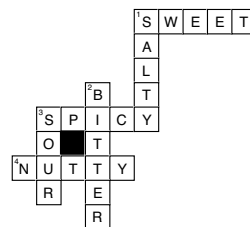
B. Comic (TN p. 3) Beginner students should practice writing sentences using the grammar in part A. More advanced students can practice varying the verb tenses. Answers will vary.

- (6) She is going to try one of the dips. She is going to dip it in the baba ganoush.

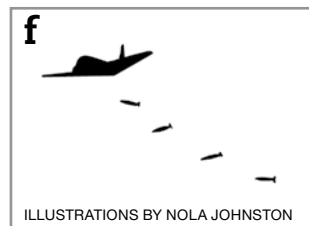
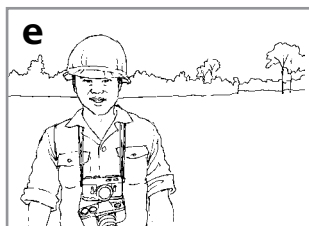
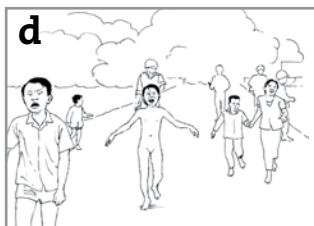
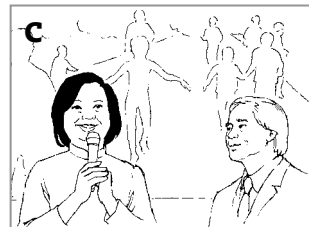
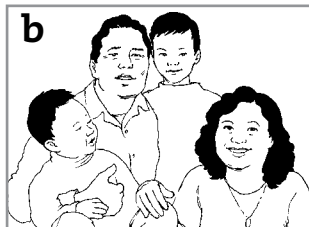

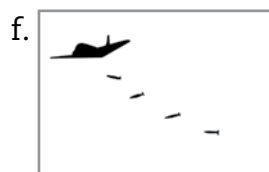

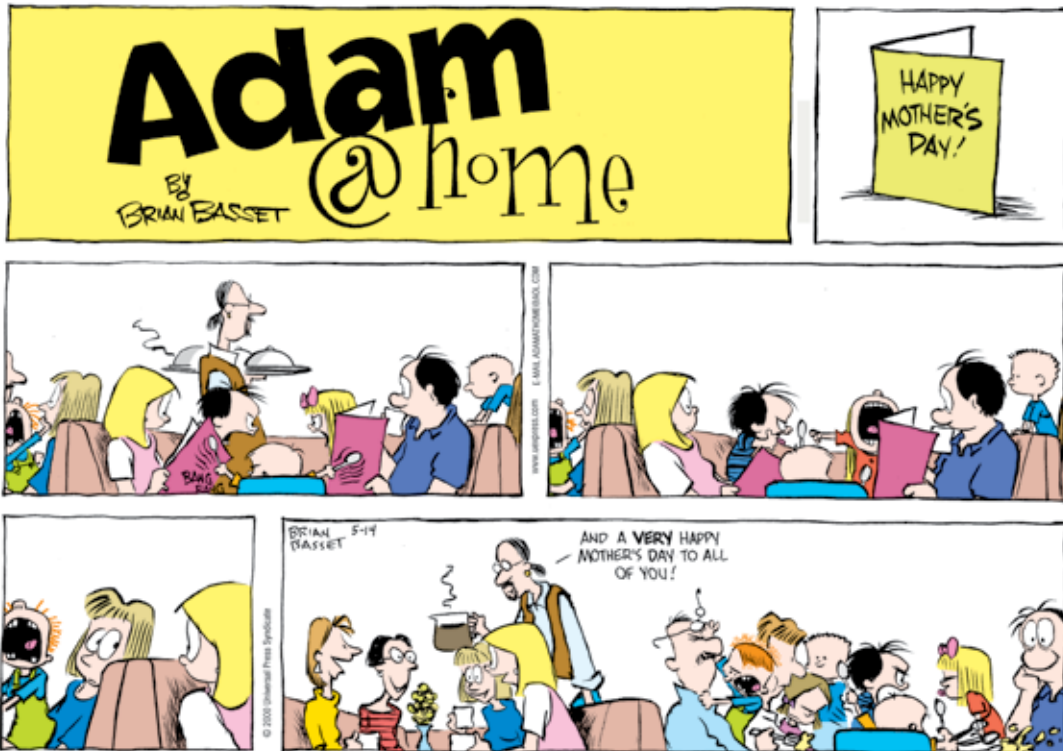
